

FAQs for Registered Physiotherapists

Practising Certificate-Linked CPD Scheme

(Updated as at May 2026)

CPD Scheme Fundamentals

Q1: What is the new Practising Certificate-linked CPD scheme and when does it come into effect?

A: As stipulated in s.16 of Allied Health Professions Ordinance, Cap. 359, Hong Kong Law, the PT Board must not issue a practising certificate to the person unless the PT Board is satisfied that the person has complied with the requirement regarding Continuing Professional Development (CPD), namely Practising Certificate-linked CPD (PC-linked CPD) scheme is a mandatory professional development requirement introduced by the Physiotherapists Board (PT Board). The scheme comes into effect on 1 July 2026, following the conclusion of the current Code-of-practise-linked (CoP-linked) CPD scheme theme that ends on 30 June 2026.

Q2: Who is required to participate in the CPD scheme? Is it applicable to me if I am not residing in Hong Kong?

A: All registered physiotherapists are subject to the mandatory PC-linked CPD scheme. Participation in CPD activities is a professional requirement for maintaining a valid practising certificate, regardless of whether the registrant resides in Hong Kong or overseas.

CPD Cycle and Point Requirements

Q3: How long is the CPD cycle and when does my cycle start/end?

A: Each CPD cycle spans three years, commencing on 1 July of the first year and ending on 30 June of the fourth year. The CPD cycle end date is synchronized with the validity period of the practising certificate, meaning both will conclude on 30 June of the fourth year.

Q4: How many CPD points do I need to obtain per cycle?

A: Registrants are required to attain a minimum of **45 CPD points** in a 3-year CPD cycle with a **minimum of 5 CPD points** in each year during the cycle. Excess CPD points cannot be rolled over or carried forward to the next CPD cycle.

Q5: What if I obtain my practising certificate partway through a CPD cycle?

A: When a physiotherapist is registered after the commencement of the prevailing CPD cycle, the CPD point requirement depends on the date of obtaining their practising certificates. Registrants with certificates having a validity period of 2 to 2.5 years are allowed to attain 30 CPD points. The following table outlines the specific requirements for different registration periods:

Q6: Can I start accumulating CPD points before I receive my practising certificate?

A: No, registrants can only accumulate CPD points after their practising certificates have been officially issued. Any CPD activities undertaken before the issuance of a practising certificate cannot be credited toward the CPD requirement.

CPD Activities and CPD Point Allocation

Q7: What types of CPD activities are recognized for CPD points?

A: The CPD scheme recognizes six main categories of CPD activities: (I) Attendance at lecture/seminar/conference, (II) Post-graduate studies, (III) In-service training, (IV) Self-study, (V) Active participation, and (VI) Publication. Each category has specific requirements and CPD point allocation formulas to support a diverse range of professional development approaches. For detailed information on each category's specific requirements and CPD point allocation, please refer to the PT Board's CPD manual.

Q8: Do I need to submit my self-study summary to the PT Board?

A: No, registrants are not required to submit self-study summaries to the PT Board. However, you must retain copies of your summaries as evidence of self-study and supporting documentation for six years. The PT Board may request submission of these summaries for verification under certain circumstances, including but not limited to random audits or when a registrant's CPD record has been selected for review.

Q9: If I attend the same course multiple times within one cycle, can I earn CPD points each time?

A: No, registrants can only earn CPD points for attending the same CPD activity once per cycle. However, if the activity is updated with new content or if you participate in a different role (such as changing from participant to speaker), you may earn CPD points for the new participation.

Q10: If a CPD programme spans two CPD cycles, in which period will I earn CPD points?

A: Registrants will earn CPD points upon completion of the course, and the CPD points are credited to the cycle in which the course is concluded.

CPD Record Management and Audit

Q11: How do I record and report my CPD attainment?

A: All registrants are required to maintain comprehensive records of their participation in CPD activities by utilizing the self-declaration form provided in Appendix III of the CPD manual, the form could be downloaded from the PT Board's website.

Q12: Will the PT Board conduct audits to verify my CPD records?

A: Yes, the PT Board would conduct random audits from time to time to ensure compliance with CPD requirements. When requested by the PT Board, registrants must provide the relevant supporting documents within the specified time period. Each PT should retain relevant supporting documents for six years.

Compliance, Non-Compliance and Remedial Mechanism

Q13: What happens if I do not meet the CPD point requirement?

A: If you have attained at least two-thirds of the required points (i.e., 30 points for a full cycle or pro-rata equivalent), your non-compliance is remediable. You will be required to engage in a remedial programme to earn the remaining points by the end of the next CPD cycle. If you have attained less than two-thirds of the required points without acceptable reasons, the PT Board will not issue a practising certificate renewal, and you will not be able to practice as a physiotherapist. You are required to attain 90 CPD points before applying for practising certificate / restoration.

Q14: What is the remedial mechanism if I fall short of the CPD requirement?

A: If you achieve at least two-thirds of the required CPD points (i.e., 30 points for a full cycle or pro-rata equivalent) but fall short of the full requirement, you are eligible to enter a remedial programme. The remedial programme must be completed within the subsequent CPD cycle. This requires you to concurrently fulfil both your regular CPD requirements for the new cycle and your additional remedial obligations. It is important to note that the remedial cycle represents the final and sole opportunity for remediation, no additional opportunities will be provided. Some examples of remediable scenarios and their corresponding additional requirements are available in the table of paragraph 9 of the CPD Manual.

Q15: Can I apply for an exemption from the CPD requirement?

A: Yes, registrants could be certified to have a medical condition or other circumstances which the Board may consider as acceptable reasons for exemptions from CPD (e.g. prolonged illness, and permanent disability). Registrants should submit an exemption application to the PT Board for consideration on a case-by-case basis.

Governance and Accountability

Q16: What are the consequences of submitting false or misleading information about CPD attainment?

A: False reporting may constitute a criminal offense under applicable legislation and may expose you to criminal liability in addition to professional disciplinary action by the Board. It is therefore critical to ensure the accuracy and truthfulness of all CPD documentation and reports submitted to the PT Board.

Q17: Why do fresh graduates need to comply with CPD requirements? They have just graduated with updated knowledge?

A: The purpose of CPD is to encourage members of the profession to keep abreast of the latest developments and to enhance professional knowledge and skills through ongoing participation in professional development activities. While fresh graduates have recently completed their formal training, lifelong learning remains essential to maintain professional competence in a changing healthcare environment.

Q18: If I submit an application to the PT Board for CPD accreditation, when can I receive the result?

A: The Education Committee of the PT Board and the programme administrators convene CPD accreditation meetings every month. Under normal circumstances, the expected processing timeline for CPD accreditation applications is approximately 6 weeks counting from the submission of completed set of applications and necessary supporting documents.

Q19: Why does the application process take a relatively long time?

A: Due to the high volume of applications, occasional incomplete supporting documents, and the need for thorough review and quality assurance, the processing time may be longer in some cases. We appreciate your understanding and patience.
